

# BREAKING THROUGH BARRIERS TO PROVIDE HOPE FEATURING PAULA PARKS, NP

The Transition Clinic serves discharged hospital patients who have ongoing healthcare needs that are exacerbated by socio-economic hardships. The Transition Clinic is not intended to be permanent care for patients; however, sometimes they need more than a few visits to get on track, especially for patients with multiple complex chronic conditions.

To meet this challenge, United Regional's Community Health team started the High Needs Medical Program (HNMP) in 2022. If patients meet criteria, they are enrolled in the program and can receive care at the Transition Clinic for up to 1.5 years. When a patient is identified as "ready" to transition to a more permanent primary care physician (PCP) setting, the HNMP provider and navigation team collaborate to oversee an effective transition.

In addition to hospital discharges, sometimes candidates for the HNMP are identified at community sponsored events such as the Mobile Food Pantry and educational events.

While in the HNMP, Paula Parks, Nurse

Practitioner (NP), becomes their

PCP. She works with

navigators, nurses,

specialists, to meet patients' needs. She said,

"The goal of the HNMP is to make the patient ready to be successful in primary care outside of the Transition Clinic. We have successfully placed many patients into primary care, and they are thriving and doing well." Since its inception, over 300 patients have gone through this program.

Education is a key component of the HNMP. Patients learn how to care for their health needs. Paula remarked, "For example, they learn that it is their responsibility to call the pharmacy when they run out of medication. Also, instead of going to the Emergency Department for minor symptoms, they learn to call

me as their PCP or go to the walk-in clinic for nonemergent needs." This saves money for the whole system.

She added, "We work to get them insurance and teach them to advocate for their own health care."

Many patients want to get better, and for them, the program has become a beacon of hope.

"The **Community Care Fund** is instrumental in getting these patients prepared to care for their own health,"


said Paula. "We depend on the Fund to get medications started, and other needs such as surgical assistance, dental and eye care, and more."

Nurses and navigators work constantly to find resources so that the **Community Care Fund** stretches as far as possible. This resourcefulness makes it possible to use the **Community Care Fund** for many needs. The entire team at the Transition Clinic is grateful for donations to the **Community Care Fund**. Paula concluded, "We can do more now than we ever have done before."

United Regional is making a positive difference in the lives of those in our community. In fact, in 2023, United Regional's cardiovascular team:

- Performed 32,000 ECGs, 7,500 echocardiograms, and 570 stress tests
- Assisted patients with over 10,000 cardiopulmonary visits
- Treated over 2,400 patients in the Cath Lab
- Completed 1,250 heart catheterizations
- Opened over 360 clogged arteries with stents
- Placed over 200 pacemakers
- Helped over 100 patients with ablations
- Aided over 80 patients who were having a heart attack

In addition to these services, and to save patients the hassle and stress of traveling out of town, United Regional also provides many advanced procedures, available locally to serve friends and family. This includes treatments that some may be unaware of:

#### **SHOCKWAVE**

Ultrasonic waves are used to break up calcified plague in the coronaries and peripherally.

#### **PENUMBRA**

Treatment to remove soft clots in the coronary arteries and peripherally.

#### TREATMENT OF **PULMONARY EMBOLISMS**

Treatment to remove clots in the pulmonary arteries.

#### TAVR - TRANSCATHETER **AORTIC VALVE REPLACEMENT**

Treatment to replace the aortic valve, which is done through the femoral artery. This eliminates the need to cut open the chest to replace the aortic valve.

#### TCAR - TRANSCAROTID **ARTERY REVASCULARIZATION**

Procedure places a stent in the carotid artery utilizing a device that reverses the blood flow. This reduces the risk of plaque breaking off and causing a stroke.

#### **EVAR - ENDOVASCULAR AORTIC REPAIR**

Treatment to repair an abdominal aneurysm through the femoral artery. This eliminates the need to cut open the abdomen to place a graft in the aorta.

#### **IMPELLA**

This medical device pumps blood from the left ventricle into the ascending aorta, delivering oxygenrich blood to the rest of the body, allowing the heart to rest.

Advancements in cardiovascular health at United Regional were celebrated at Heart of the Community (HOTC), hosted by the United Regional Foundation on February 10 at the new Delta Hotel in Downtown Wichita Falls. Cath Lab Coordinator, Larry Dwyer, delivered an informative presentation, showcasing a host of advanced cardiovascular procedures currently available to patients at United Regional.

**HEART OF THE COMMUNITY** 

Keynote speaker, **Craig Karges**, delighted the large crowd with illusions that involved several HOTC guests. He has made over 5,000 appearances on four continents and in all 50 states. Craig is the author of the best selling book, *Ignite Your Imagination*. Craig shared memory techniques and encouraged all to tap into the power of the subconscious mind to enhance creativity, intuition, and decision making.



### Orthopedics EXPRESS

If suffering from a sprain, fracture, knee pain, or more, United Regional now offers a walk-in orthopedic clinic where no appointment or referral is needed. Orthopedics Express opened in October 2023, located inside the beautiful Center for Advanced Orthopedics at 1620 8th St, along Brook St.

The idea for a walk-in clinic emerged from a brainstorming session between Denna Green, URPG Practice Manager-Orthopedics, Michael Garner, Director of Surgical and Specialty Clinics, and Johnny Roberts, Vice President of Physician Practice Services.

After that initial conversation, professionals from across United Regional pulled together to bring the idea to fruition. "Sylvia Payton, Nurse Practitioner, has been our provider champion and has been a tremendous resource in growing our orthopedic walkin clinic," commented Denna.

"Over and over, we receive positive responses for having an express clinic as an option," said Michael. "Patients can get treatment here instead of going to the Emergency Department or other places where orthopedic care is not available." Michael added that if the problem cannot be fixed or taken care of in Orthopedics Express, a process can begin to facilitate a quick referral to an orthopedic surgeon.

Orthopedics Express sees a range of patients, ages two and up. Conditions not treated include injuries to the back, neck, and chest. Orthopedics Express has been popular with athletes of all ages. One of them is Linda Knox.

Linda recently came to Orthopedics Express with knee and leg pain. She was pleased with her experience,

from the moment she walked in the door until she left. "It was a short wait, maybe five to ten minutes," Linda explained. "I was surprised how quickly I was seen. It was excellent care. They listened to my concerns and had me make various movements to make sure they understood the issue. After x-rays and discussing ways to move forward, I was completely satisfied when I left."

The best news for Linda was that she was able to return to her regular exercising routine. Linda would recommend others who might find themselves in similar need to use Orthopedics Express.

Although walk-in is an option, patients are encouraged to make an appointment if they want to come at a specific time. Self-scheduling is available through MyChart, or patients can call 940-764-5400. Orthopedics Express is open Monday-Thursday from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m., and Friday from 8 a.m. - noon.

ast Fall, little Luca Boyd made his grand entrance into the world over nine weeks early! His parents, Michael and Brooke Boyd, were new to Wichita Falls, having moved here in May 2023 with their two sons, Colston (5) and Shepherd (3). Michael is an Emergency Department physician at United Regional and Brooke is an RN. They were comforted that United Regional was well-prepared for Luca's early arrival with its Level II Special Care Nursery and competent staff.

Luca was born at 30.6 weeks, weighing 4 pounds, 10 ounces.

Brooke held her precious newborn for only a moment before he was taken to the Special Care Nursery. There, he received

advanced care to help him stabilize and grow. A Giraffe Bed became his temporary home - keeping his temperature at an ideal level, monitoring his weight and vital signs, plus more.

Before moving to Wichita Falls, Brooke served as a Neonatal Intensive Care (NICU) nurse. She said, "I have been on the medical side of it, but being on the parent side is so much different. It's so scary." Brooke was aware of the process in caring for premature newborns, but not being in control was hard. Her distress lightened when she saw how the nurses took care of Luca like he was their own.

"It's the most unnatural thing to walk out of the hospital without your baby in your arms, but knowing he was receiving the best of care made it easier to leave." While Luca's

After five long days, Mom and Dad were able to hold Luca, skin to skin. Luca went home shortly after and has thrived ever since.
